Rhodes Orchid Odyssey 2nd - 8th April 2023 Led by Yiannis Christofides & Jon Dunn

April 2nd

Arrival at Diagoras airport on Rhodes. Once everyone had gathered, the remainder of the day was taken up with transferring from the airport to the hotel in Embonas.

April 3rd

We assembled at 9.00 am for a briefing and then set off to walk on a local path near the village to explore the slopes on this side of Attaviros mountain. The path wound up the slope, passing through scrub rich in flowers. Many annuals in the Fabaceae were in flower as well as orchids growing among them. We found the dark blue *Muscari neglectum* as well as *M. commosum*, *Erodium gruinum*, *Salvia fruticosa*, the beautiful *Ornithogalum nutans*, *Ophrys omegaifera*, *Orchis*



anatolica, Asphodelus ramosus, Arisarum vulgare, Quercus coccifera, Ranunculus creticus, Anemone coronaria, Arabis verna, Anchusa undulata subsp. hybrida, Cyclamen rhodium, and scattered Ophrys ferrum-equinum, but also an amazing collection of about 70 plants, beautifully in flower. We saw and photographed Eastern Festoon and Green Hairstreak butterflies. It was now nearing lunchtime so we returned to the hotel and set off down the road into the village for coffee before taking a 15 minute drive higher up Attaviros to where we had our picnic. The area is dominated by Cypressus sempervirens and Pinus brutia woodland.

During the afternoon we explored the area there finding *Ophrys fusca* subsp. *cinereophila, Ophrys candida, Ophrys reinholdii, Orchis anatolica* and the first flowers of *Limodorum abortivum*. Greenunderside Blue and Green Hairstreak butterflies were on the wing. We walked down the road looking at the verges and finding more *Ophrys reinholdii* in excellent order. Our final stop was a short distance from the village to look at another beautiful Rhodian orchid, *Ophrys lucis*.

April 4th

The morning dawned cold and rainy, but by the time breakfast was over the sky had cleared and we set off due south to Katavia. We slowly descended observing the landscape changing from pine forest to garigue. Our first stop was on a hillside with low cushion plants. Cistus parviflorus, Asphodelus fistulosus and Glebionis coronaria were in full flower. A Raven was seen flying overhead. We searched the hillside, finding Ophrys oestrifera subsp. cornutula, Serapias orientalis, Anacamptis coriophora, Anacamptis pyramidalis, Ophrys parvula, Ophrys cretica subsp. beloniae, Ophrys regisferdinandii, Ophrys calypsus and Ophrys iricolor. We found many other plants as well, such as Pallenis spinosa, Cytinus hypocistis, Blackstonia perfiolata and Reseda lutea. Finally one good specimen of Ophrys speculum was found.

We then drove a short distance and stopped for lunch at a little church. Here we saw more Ophrys cretica subsp. beloniae, Ophrys

regis-ferdinandii, Ophrys oestrifera subsp. cornutula and Serapias parviflora, one of the rarer species in the genus. Not far from here we saw a field full of Gladiolus italicus. Our next stop was a little way down the road to Prasonisi where we found Alkanna tinctoria, Anchusa azurea and a large colony of Oprhys rhodia. A single specimen of Ophrys calypsus was also found.

We started to retrace our steps back to Embonas, stopping at a beach. The normally very colourful beach was drying up because of the early season. We saw the endemic *Campanula rhodia, Rumex bucephalophorus* and *Ononis natrix*. Two Woodchat shrikes provided good views. Our final stop on the way back was to see *Centaurea lactucifolia*, finding it in good flower.

April 5th

It was cloudy again this morning as we set off towards Profitis Elias. This is an area dominated by



Cupressus sempervirens and Pinus brutia. The understory is carpeted with Anemone blanda and Cyclamen rhodium. Stopping at an area just Priofitis Elias before we began our search for orchids. We found Ophrys reinholdii, Ophrys oreas and Ophrys dodekanensis, Ophrys ferrum-equinum, Ophrys sicula, Anacamptis papilionaceae, Orchis provincialis, and Neotinea maculata. Searching a bit further we found Paeonia clusii subsp. rhodia in flower. Moving higher up the hill, a different set of orchids awaited us. We found beautiful Anacamptis picta and Neotinea lactea in good flower. Also more Orchis provincialis, Ranunculus paludosus, Echium plantagineum and Tuberaria gutata.

Having explored the site we then drove past Profitis Elias and started to descend towards Laerma, via Apollona. We made a brief stop to photograph *Scilla hyacinthoides* and then stopped for lunch.

After our picnic we searched and found *Ophrys mammosa* and *Orchis italica*. Many Green Hairstreaks and Green-underside Blues were on the wing, feeding on the Asphodels. We continued, stopping at the Italian bridge to see more *Orchis italica* and also finding *Ophrys heldreichii* subsp. *polyxo* and a number of ferns.

Our next stop was at the lake on Gaidouras river where we searched the scree for specialist plants, finding *Campanula rhodensis*, *Gypsophila confertifolia*, *Trifolium grandiflorum*, *Linaria micrantha* and *Linaria pelisseriana*. We also found many *Fritillaria rhodia* and *Serapias politisii*. An interesting moth drew our attention, turning out to be *Arctia festiva*, the Hebe Tiger Moth. A Pygmy Skipper was also seen. Another stop produced two new orchids, *Anacamptis laxiflora and Ophrys bombyliflora*. We stopped once more to see *Silene salamandra* and also finding many more *Fritillaria rhodia*.



April 6th

With another cloudy start to the day, we crossed the island to the east coast in search of sunshine and calm weather, as sporadic cloud and rain was forecast across the much of the island. Our first site proved reliable for *Ophrys colossea*, with several fine plants in flower beneath olive trees. Further back in the olive grove we found more *Ophrys mammosa*, *Ophrys rhodia*, and *Ophrys heldreichii* subsp. *polyxo*. Many *Serapias politisi* were found throughout the area, including a hypochromic individual. As we walked back towards the vehicles a lone orchid proved to be a fine *Ophrys bilunulata*.

The nearby beach was a happy hunting ground for some non-orchids, including yellow mounds of *Alyssum sibiricum*, and a flowering *Dianthus critinus*. Birds here were better still, with a small flock of Short-toed Larks seen, as well as Tawny Pipit and Black-eared Wheatear. The drive to our lunch site further down the coast was to yield a Blue Rock Thrush

too.

Lunch was taken in an area of olive groves further inland – a short walk after lunch found us surrounded by many *Serapias carica* and *Ophrys oestrifera subsp. cornutula*. Closer inspection of the Ophrys revealed some more *Ophrys heldreichii* subsp. *polyxo*, and a fine example of *Ophrys umbilicata*. Nearby two more *Orchis anthropophora* were added to the day's tally.

One final olive grove for the day gave us the expected *Ophrys blitopertha* in profusion and fine condition and, amongst them, some newly opened *Ophrys attaviria* too. Yet another surprise came in the form of a single example of *Ophrys apollonae*. We left as the skies darkened and the first spots of rain were felt. The journey back to the hotel featured thunder, lightning, and torrential rain.



April 7th

After a continued thunderstorm overnight, we woke to the promise of a brighter day. We headed



back to the south of the island but, this time, inland and high on a hill with a commanding view of the coast all around us. The hill was covered with scrubby vegetation that, at first glance, may have seemed unpromising, but on closer inspection was hiding a wide variety of orchids, some familiar to the group, but a handful of new ones in their midst – *Ophrys sitiaca*, *Ophrys lutea* subsp. phryganae, and *Ophrys tenthredinifera*. These were in addition to Anacamptis papilionacae, *Ophrys reinholdii*, *Ophrys ferrumequinum*, and *Ophrys dodekanensis* alongside yet more *Ophrys heldreichii* subsp. polyxo.

Moving half a mile downhill after lunch yielded more of the same, but with many *Ophrys bombyliflora*, some dainty fritillaries, and an *Ornithogalum* that Yiannis declined to identify as Rhodes is home to a great many similar species. We made our way back towards our hotel, distracted by some good bird sightings from the vehicle – Chukar, many Woodchat Shrikes, and a showy Hoopoe. Before

we called it a day though, we spent an hour back up Mt Attaviros, where we found *Limodorum* abortivum coming into flower at last, and more and better *Ophrys candica* than hitherto. A Wryneck put in an appearance at the same place we had seen it earlier in the week.

April 8th

With our orchid list now sitting on a magnificent 46 species, a record total for this tour, we knew we'd effectively wiped the board, and had a free day at our disposal. We decided to pioneer, and to explore some parts of the island we were unfamiliar with. The morning began near Kymissala,

where we walked a long woodland track towards the eponymous necropolis. A few orchids were forthcoming – *Neotinea maculata*, *Ophrys candica*, *lutea* subsp. *phryganae*, and *fusca* subsp. *cinereophila* – but we weren't overwhelmed with either species or numbers.

The necropolis itself was a pleasing diversion, however, and we wandered amongst the small tombs carved into the living rock for a short while before returning to the vehicles. Honeybees belonging to the many hives in the general area were getting more active and curious about us, so we decided to beat a prudent retreat. Before leaving, we found a few *Ophrys rhodia* in the grass beside the vehicles, and a dung beetle in the road that was plainly delighted to be introduced to some fresh sheep droppings.

Heading towards Monolithos, another speculative stop yielded a small colony of *Ophrys regis-ferdinandii* and, in its midst, a single example of its hybrid with *O. speculum*. A nearby Green-underside Blue was much



admired. We climbed up to the acropolis of Monolithos, a cultural diversion that also gave us a fine example of *Campanula hagielia* growing from the blockwork of the castle walls. We climbed back down to meet up with Matt Berry for lunch on a nearby beach, and then decided to head towards Embonas and explore the vicinity of a small colony of *Ophrys mammosa* Yiannis had found a week ago.



We walked two tracks that led away from this spot. The first was disappointing, with just a few *Ophrys reinholdii* to show for our efforts. The second track was superb – within half a mile we notched up immaculate *Ophrys reinholdii*, mammosa, sicula, oestrifera subsp. cornutula, regis-ferdinandii, bombyliflora and bilunulata, and discovered a new colony of *Serapias parviflora* for good measure!

With the afternoon wearing on, this seemed like a good point at which to draw the orchid-hunting to a close. No new species added today, but we'd not expected to do so... but what a site we'd

uncovered together as our parting gesture in Rhodes!
