



Butterflies of Goa

12th - 25th November 2025

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Wednesday 12th

We met the 3 guests at Doha airport for the final leg of our journey to Goa. We arrived at Manohar International airport in Goa at 2.30am local time but 9.00pm by our body clocks. We were met by our bus driver and staff from the villa who presented Anne with some flowers. Our journey to the villa was not too bad and best done in the middle of the night, as a lot of main roads are not finished. We arrived at the Villa at 5am. After a brief sleep and breakfast we walked to some local places which had a few butterflies and relaxed by the pool.

Thursday 13th

We visited Mystic Woods today, a butterfly garden run by our friends Yashoden and Jyoti. We saw lots of butterflies, including Malabar Banded Peacock. We had good views Common Mormon, Tamil Lacewing, Tailed Jay and others. We had a delightful lunch that Jyoti had prepared herself.

Friday 14th

After a pre-dawn coffee, as we did on most mornings before leaving the villa, we had an hour-long journey to Netravali National Park, picking Parag up in Margao. We were greeted by Southern Birdwing at our picnic breakfast on arrival, and on our walk clocked up a total of 59 species. Crossing the stream required taking one's boots off, but it was neither fast nor deep. We found the magnificent Blue Oakleaf in an irrigation channel, looking identical to a dead leaf till it opens its wings. The destination by the river had Malabar Tree Nymph, Cruiser, Indian Sunbeam, Malabar Banded Peacock, and Lesser Gull. We went to a Spice Farm for lunch, which was enjoyed by everyone.

Saturday 15th

This morning, we made a trip to the ancient Tamdi Surla temple, breakfasting with a picnic by the river nearby, where we saw a magnificent Southern Birdwing, which Gill managed to photograph. We met up with some friends, Pete Smith and his wife, with 2 of their friends. It was windy, and we made our way to this interesting 13th-century temple early. We took a walk through the woods where the highlights were Grey Count, Clipper, Leaf Blue, Monkey Puzzle and Dark Wanderer. We enjoyed our lunch at Nature's Nest, where we were able to do some birdwatching.

Sunday 16th

Today, we again set out early for a long drive into the Cotiago wildlife area. We walked through a village and observed butterflies from a bridge near the river.

We had Gladeye Bushbrown, good views of Monkey Puzzle and a group of Common Jay and Southern Bluebottle by the river. We moved on to the Cotiago Butterfly garden, which had far more butterflies. Common Crow was abundant. Rustic and Tamil Yeoman were abundant. We found the lovely Red Pierrot on its foodplant and had excellent views of the endemic Malabar Tree Nymph floating down from the canopy and settling. We had two of the tigers: Glassy Tiger and Dark Blue Tiger, but not this time Blue Tiger. Tamil Lacewing was common, as was the ubiquitous Common Rose. A Southern Birdwing made a brief appearance.

Monday 17th

We again took a picnic breakfast, which we enjoyed by a river with prehistoric rock carvings. Butterflies were scarce, but we got nice views of Common Golden Back Woodpecker. We went on

to a waterfall in the Netravali wildlife area, which has given us several good sightings in the past. On arrival, Parag spotted a Giant Squirrel and a Spot-bellied Eagle-Owl up in the trees. We also saw Paradise Flycatcher. Here, despite the tourists stopping for photos, we had Clipper, Leaf Blue, Cruiser and the spectacular Gaudy Baron and Red Spot Duke. The wet soil meant that butterflies settled to drink. A Lascar was caught and eaten in the web of a huge spider. Common Imperial was photographed, as was Banded Blue Pierrot. An Indian Sunbeam was seen by everyone. Again, a Southern Birdwing made a brief appearance, and we saw several Red Helen. We again went to the Spice Farm for an excellent lunch.

Tuesday 18th

Today we went deep into the Netravali forest, looked for butterflies on the roadsides and took a short walk into the forest. We had views of Southern Birdwing, Blackvein Sergeant and many other forest butterflies. We saw the rare Yellowjack Sailer and a host of other butterflies including Malabar Tree Nymph. There is something special about Indian tropical forests. They seem well protected, there is a small charge for entry, and there are control points on the main roads. The butterfly diversity is amazing, as most Goan butterflies are forest or forest edge species, with few associated with grassland, unlike in Europe. There are 1700 species of trees in Goa and hundreds of forest vines, epiphytes and shrubs. We added Fluffy Tit to a list of butterflies with great sightings of Red Helen, to the delight of photographers.

Wednesday 19th

This morning, we visited a dairy farm with a garden dedicated to butterflies, planted with numerous butterfly food plants and nectar sources. It is run by Rabi, who is a real expert on Indian butterfly life cycles and breeding caterpillars. We had views of Crimson Rose, Tamil Treebrown, Common Nawab, and Pale Wanderer. Rabi found many caterpillars and even eggs and pupae, which he was able to identify. His knowledge of butterflies, their foodplants and early stages was amazing. The highlight was a collection of Crows and Tigers taking a poisonous alkaloid from the shrubs Crotalaria species, which makes them distasteful to birds. We had Brown King Crow as well as Common Crow and Glassy Tiger, Striped Tiger and Blue Tiger.

Thursday 20th

Today we visited the Surla plateau at 800m in the Western Ghats. It was drier than on previous visits, and butterflies were scarce. We did find Banded Royal, Great Orange Tip and Chocolate Albatross. Steve saw Tinsel, and all of us saw Tailed Palmfly. Zebra Blue, which I had not seen before, stayed at the top of a plant stem but was very difficult to photograph as the camera's autofocus ignored it and went for the background. We missed several species that we had seen in the past because of the conditions, but the views of a waterfall in the distance made up for it.

Friday 21st

We made our usual trip on Betty's boat, starting with good views of Indian Humpback Dolphins out at sea. We then travelled upriver. A delicious lunch of Garlic Prawns and Dorado Fish was included in the cost. After several Mojitos, the party really got going with guests and all of us dancing with a group of Indian ladies from Pune on a works outing. It was an enjoyable break from butterflies.

Saturday 22nd

Today we went to a new site at a fort on the coast, where we breakfasted overlooking the sea and saw Redspot. Our walk around the fort was hot, but we did see Southern Birdwing and both Common and Crimson Rose. They rarely settled for more than a couple of seconds, being very difficult to photograph. We went for a fish lunch at a beach shack, where some enjoyed a swim.

Sunday 23rd

Our last day was devoted to bird watching with an early morning boat trip up the Zuari river. We saw 48 species of birds, including 6 of the Kingfishers found in India, lots of Herons, Great Crested Tern, White-bellied Sea Eagle and others. We saw several Mugger Crocodiles too. In the afternoon, we visited some rice paddy fields with thousands of waders, Glossy Ibis, Storks and 4 types of Egret. There was a flock of Small Pratincoles, Black-winged Stilt, Booted Eagle, a Greater Spotted Eagle flying above us, Lesser Whistling Duck, Gadwall and Northern Shoveler.

Monday 24th

Today was our relaxed day, and an optional tour was arranged with Parag's wife, Shraddha, who took us to Chandor, which once served as the capital of Goa. We visited 2 original homes from this period and the ruins of an 11th-century Shiva Temple.

Summary

Fortunately, Parag, our local guide, is as good with birds as he is with butterflies. We are getting used to the traffic in Goa with motor scooters everywhere, cows and dogs lying in the road and no apparent rules. Our driver, Altef, who was also with us last year, was completely brilliant. This year, Skippers were very scarce as there were lots more in previous years. Goa had had an unseasonal storm a few weeks ago before we arrived. We missed a couple of the larger butterflies that we have seen singly in previous years, but still had 128 species, only a few less than last year. We did, however, have more sightings of charismatic species like Southern Birdwing and the three Rose Swallowtails.
